

The Holy Family of Jesus,
Mary and Joseph





Today's readings speak to us about family, faith, and justice—how God's justice is reflected in the faithful actions of His people. From Hannah in 1 Samuel to the Holy Family's journey to the Temple, we see what it means to live a life rooted in God's justice.

In the first reading, we hear the story of Hannah, a woman who longed for a child. When her prayer was answered, she kept her promise and dedicated her son Samuel to the Lord. Hannah's act is one of justice—not justice as the world defines it, but justice as right relationship with God. She recognized her son as a gift from God and returned him to God's service. Justice begins when we acknowledge God as the source of all we have and live in gratitude and trust.

The psalmist echoes this idea, proclaiming the joy of living in God's presence: "How lovely is your dwelling place, O Lord of hosts!" True justice flows from this deep longing for God's will to reign in our lives. When we live with our hearts set on Him, we are empowered to create a world that reflects His love, peace, and fairness.

In the second reading, John reminds us of our identity as children of God. This is the foundation of justice: every person is made in God's image and is worthy of dignity and respect. Justice calls us to see others as God sees them and to treat them with love. It is not enough to feel love in our hearts; we must live it through our actions. John says, "We should believe in the name of his Son, Jesus Christ, and love one another, just as he commanded us."

Finally, in the Gospel, we see the Holy Family traveling to Jerusalem for the Passover. This simple act of faithfulness to God's law reminds us of the role of families in living out justice. Mary and Joseph nurtured Jesus in a household centered on God's will. Families are the first schools of justice, where children learn to love, forgive, and act with integrity.

So, what does this mean for us? Justice begins in our relationship with God but must extend into our relationships with others. Are we like Hannah, offering our gifts for God's purposes? Are we like the psalmist, seeking to make God's presence central in our lives? Are we like the Holy Family, nurturing faith and love in our homes?

Justice is not just a concept; it is a way of life. It is standing up for the vulnerable, sharing our blessings, and living in harmony with God's plan. Let us pray today for the courage to be people of justice, rooted in God's love, and to reflect His justice in our families, our communities, and our world.

God's Justice in the Bible

Mark Etling will be presenting a three-part series on January 8, 15 and 22, 6:30 pm at St. Pius, Singler Hall, *God's Justice in the Bible*.

Justice is one of the attributes of God that isn't talked about nearly enough. Yet it is fundamental to the understanding of the nature and character of the Christian and Jewish God. God is love - but one of the most important ways God's love becomes real in the world is through justice.

In this three-part series, we will examine the justice of God. First of all, in the Old Testament, or Hebrew Scriptures. Second, through the message of Jesus and his Reign of God movement. Third, we will see how the early Christian movement backed away from the practice of justice as it cozied up to the Roman Empire.

The Baptismal Call to Justice

"In the one Spirit we were all baptized into one body – Jews or Greeks, slave or free – and we were all made to drink of the one Spirit." (1 Corinthians 12:13)

do justice • love tenderly • walk humbly with God Micah 6:8

"There is neither Jew nor Greek, there is neither slave nor free, there is neither male nor female; for you are all one in Christ Jesus." (Galatians 3:28)

In these verses Paul is making a critical point about the meaning of Baptism. By affirming the equality of all believers, Paul is saying that one of the primary effects of baptism is the call to justice. Our common status as baptized Christians makes us all equals before God and under God - and therefore entitled to the same rights and responsibilities.

In other parts of his letters Paul explains in greater depth the meaning of radical equality in Christianity, and its implications for justice.

The Letter to Philemon deals with a situation in which one of Philemon's slaves, a young man named Onesimus, had fled from him. Onesimus has come to Paul seeking asylum, having been converted by him to Christianity. Paul might have asked Philemon to take Onesimus back as a forgiven slave. Or he could have asked Philemon to give Onesimus to him as his slave. But Paul chose neither of these options. Instead, he sends the young man back to his owner so that Philemon can fulfill his "duty" and voluntarily set him free. Paul tells Philemon he must free Onesimus because they are equals – both as Christians and as human beings. Paul sees a contradiction in a Christian master owning a Christian slave. Persons cannot be equal in Christ, but unequal in society. Equality is not spiritual only, according to Paul – it is physical as well. It is a matter of justice.

In chapter 7 of the first letter to the Corinthians Paul makes it clear that husbands and wives have mutual obligations to each other - that they are equals. In discussing the question of sexual abstinence in marriage, he says: "The husband must give his wife what she has a right to expect, and so too the wife to the husband. "On the issue of divorce, Paul says, "A wife must not leave her husband . . . nor must a husband send his wife away." The main point here is not sexual abstinence or divorce - it is the mutuality and equality of man and woman in marriage.

Paul affirms the equality of men and women in Christian worship in 1 Corinthians 11: "For a man to pray or prophesy with his head covered is a sign of disrespect to his head. For a woman, however, it is a sign of disrespect to her head if she prays or prophesies unveiled . . ." The primary point in this passage, which often goes unnoticed, is that both men and women were playing a leadership role in public worship - leadership of prayer and prophecy were both recognized as official ministries of the Christian movement.

In Romans chapter 16 Paul mentions several men and women by name whom he calls "apostles" - ones who are commissioned to preach the Gospel and to establish new Christian communities. Apostleship was the highest status a Christian could have in the early days of Christianity - and it was assigned to both women and men.

Later in 1 Corinthians Paul is critical of the inequality between the rich and poor in Corinth (1 Corinthians 11:17-29). And he criticizes those who claimed superiority on the basis of their spiritual charisms (1 Corinthians 12:4-7; 13:1-13). For Paul, the love that shows itself in equality is greater than the charisms - "If I speak in the tongues of men or of angels, but do not have love, I am only a resounding gong or a clanging cymbal." (1 Corinthians 13:1).

For Paul, love must include equality, and equality is the foundation of God's justice. As noted Jesus scholar John Dominic Crossan points out: "Love is the heart of justice, and justice is the social form of love."

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
